Fellow Property Owners,

After a long wet winter it would seem spring is finally upon us, time to check your drip system for leaks or start installing one. Two thirds of our water use in this community goes towards outdoor landscaping, drip systems are a great way to conserve water in the long hot months of summer.

In early April the water company paid to have a professional leak detection company do an inspection of the entire water system, no leaks were found at that time. This service was last preformed in 2012 by the same company.

In early March a suspected leak was investigated on Broadview Dr. a homeowner had a sudden foot deep sink hole develop in the street in front of his home. A contractor was called in to investigate and a five foot deep hole was dug but fortunately no leak was found.

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Water bills

Meters are read during the first few days of every other month, billings are created immediately thereafter, and water bills are sent out, usually by the 5th. Your water bill is DUE UPON RECEIPT since it is for service you received during the two months just prior to the billing. Any question? Call the office ... 707-279-8544.

At the July 19 meeting of the Board we have appointed Bob Gunion to serve on the Board on for a two year term.

Also at the July 19 meeting, the Board has approved hiring a debt collector on an as-needed basis to secure payment of past due accounts and to assist us with processing liens and other related matters. Mr. Bruce Kupferman has many years of professional experience in this area, lives locally and provides service to the other Rivieras.

Accepting the new reserve study rounded out the April 19 meeting.

85 fire safety compliance notices have been mailed out. The Fire Safety Committee will follow up with inspections to check for corrective actions. Approximately 50 piles of combustible materials were set out by property owners for the free chipping service this month.

The county department of Public Works was notified of this naturally occurring sink hole and the water company is in the process of trying to get the contractor fee reimbursed as it was a road problem. This problem lead to the company hiring the above leak detection company for a survey.

The rate study is almost complete and a report on the findings should be presented at the next board meeting. This rate study was needed in order to seek grant and loan funding for the replacement of our aging wooden water tanks.

Is your dirt moving next door?

The good news: Riviera West property owners are diligently clearing their properties and the community is looking better than ever. After five years of drought and attacks by pine beetles, a record number of pine trees have been removed. All of these activities reduce our wildfire risk.

The bad news: Bare dirt is often left exposed after trees and brush are cleared, especially when the entire root systems are removed. With our hilly terrain, even moderate rainfall will start to move exposed dirt downhill. Please survey your property for areas that are prone to erosion and take necessary steps to keep your soil from causing damage to your lot or your neighbor's property.

A small amount of effort today can prevent costly fixes in the future. Prevention measures include replanting the area and placing biodegradable erosion control netting, wattles or other materials. Putting down a layer of straw is not an effective erosion control method. And if you remove a tree on a sloped lot, it is best to leave the tree trunk in place so the root system can continue holding the soil in place while other plants get established.

The iconic stagecoach Kathleen Scavone, M.A.

Covered wagons and stagecoaches paint a quintessential portrait of the wild west in our minds.

The 19th century mode of transport has come across into our literature and culture over time. A movie classic example is "Stagecoach" with John Ford.

A stagecoach was good for all purposes – transporting people, mail and goods. They were towed by horses or mules, and were at once a dependable and necessary form of transportation.

The stagecoaches of Lake County's history were derived from the 13th century's "manuscript," according to Encyclopedias Brittanica.

In the book, "History of Lake County 1881," Lower Lake's transportation link to the external regions was discussed thusly: "Lower Lake is connected with the outside world by two stage lines, one extending from East Lake to Calistoga, and the other from Lower Lake to Woodland. The mail service has been heretofore daily for some time, but is at present only tri weekly."

When Robert Louis Stevenson lived on Mount St. Helena in 1880 he noted that two of the most popular stage drivers of the era were Clark Foss and William Spiers, who made frequent forays into Lake County.

Driver Foss is described by Menefee's Sketchbook as "second to none in the handling of horse, whip, and lines."

Foss is further described by his rival, William Spiers in his recollections: "Colonel Foss weighed two hundred and sixty five pounds, and could handle six horses like you'd handle that many cats. He would lift them right up off their feet and swing them around the corners so fast you couldn't see the leading team. He drove his stage to the Big Geysers for years, and he'd run down the last hill with a yell to wake the dead."

The Lawley toll road from Calistoga to Middletown was constructed with Lawley and his partners, Henry Boggs and William Patterson, in 1866.

The toll rates for the roads were determined by the Board of Supervisors. Some of the charges follow, below. After public outcry in 1873, the high tolls were reduced.

· Four horse team: \$1.50.

· Eight horse team: \$2.50.

· One horse buggy: \$0.75.

· Man and horse: \$0.25.

The following quote, which is paired with a photo of stagecoach driver William Spiers, in the Sharpsteen Museum in Calistoga and is an excerpt from Ken Stanton's book, "Mount St. Helena & R. L. Stevenson State Park – a History and Guide":

"William Spiers was one of the county's early freight drivers, hauling supplies to mines in Lake County. Thrifty and persevering, Bill bought the Lodi Stable and with the aid of a contract to carry U.S. Mail, operated the Calistoga Clear Lake Stage Line. Bill became one of the counties most familiar pioneers. He served on the city council 36 years. Friendly and optimistic at all times, he answered all questions of health, business or prospects with one answer, 'Finest Kind.'"

Kathleen Scavone, M.A., is a retired educator, potter, writer and author of "Anderson Marsh State Historic Park: A Walking History, Prehistory, Flora, and Fauna Tour of a California State Park" and "Native Americans of Lake County." She also writes for NASA and JPL as one of their "Solar System Ambassadors." She was selected "Lake County Teacher of the Year, 1998 99" by the Lake County Office of Education, and chosen as one of 10 state finalists the same year by the California Department of Education.
